## Fairlington Is in Arlington

The Legislature in Richmond, Virginia, now has for consideration the Charter proposed by the recently appointed charter committee of Arlington County which would permit a vote by Arlington citizens on the incorporation of Arlington County as a City. Many organizations have appeared before this Charter committee in an effort to have them include referendum and recall provisions in the charter, provisions for non-partisan elections and election of the School Board. Despite the appeals presented, the Charter was sent to Richmond without these provisions.

The Fairlington Civic Association, in conjunction with other affiliated members of the Arlington Civic Association, sent a delegate to Richmond to present the appeals again to the committee considering the Charter provisions.

As citizens of your community your responsibility will be to be ready to vote for or against the Charter if it is presented to the voters. In order to do this YOU MUST BE A REGISTERED VOTER! Voting requirements are:

1. Resident of state one year.
2. Resident of county six months.
3. Resident of precinct 30 days.
4. Payment of Poll Tax.
5. Registration.

Poll tax and registration must be taken care of at least six months before election. Act now—before it is too late.

FAIRLINGTON CIVIC ASSOCIATION—Meeting Tuesday evening, Mar. 12th. Open to all residents of Fairlington. Lt. Joseph McLane, the president, has announced that Mr. Raymond Pelissier is chairman of the nominating committee which will present the slate of officers for next year at the March meeting. A new constitution and by-laws will also be presented for adoption.

This time take a peek downstairs and see what a gay recreation room Mr. and Mrs. Leonard Thrift have in their duplex at 3018 S. Columbus. Black and red, with yellow accent is the color scheme, built up from the gray, red and black rug on the floor. The border around the rug has been given a coat of grey deck paint to harmonize with the rug color and this has also been applied to the stairway. Besides adding to the appearance this coat of paint has eliminated that cement dust which so easily tracks up the apartment after a trip downstairs.

The Thrifts also found that it is permissible to apply white or ivory wall paint. They chose white, and then added white muslin curtains with black and red print ruffles. The cretonne-covered seat is a yard bench, serving winter duty indoors. Truth is, however, this room itself serves double duty, for pleasure in the winter and for comfort in the summer when the Virginia sunshine makes the apartments too warm.

Complete privacy is gained by putting a covering over the door leading into the main basement of the building and hanging a tapestry over it. The flower pot shelves, the pictures, the bright wall

print, the colored pottery, the dried corn, and painted trays all combine to add another room for pleasant living in a Fairlington apartment, and what possibilities it suggests for adaptation to teen-age entertainment as well.

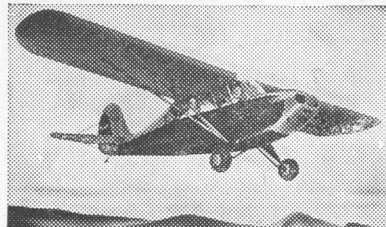
